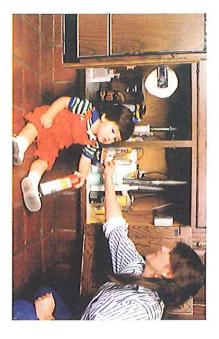

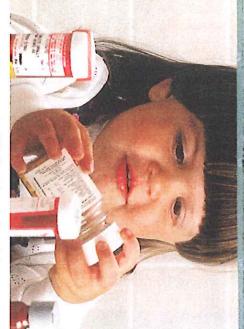

Checklist of Common Household Poisons:

Below are only some of the poisons that can be found in the home. Inspect your own home, read labels, and consult with product manufacturers, your doctor, or the Poison Control Center if you have any further questions or concerns.

Kitchen:

(under the sink & in cupboards)

- cleaning solutions & waxes
- powder and liquid detergent
- cleanser and scouring powder drain cleaner /lye
- carpet and upholstery cleaners
- oven cleaner
- cooking oils, non-stick sprays
- food supplements containing iron



Bedroom or Purse:

- sleeping drugs / medicine
- jewelry cleaner
- cosmetics
- perfume



Laundry Room:

- bleach
- soap and detergent
- disinfectant
- bluing, dye
- spot remover



Closets, Attic, and Storage Places:

- rat poison and ant poison
- · moth balls and spray

Sathroom:

- acetaminophen, aspirin all drugs and pills, medicine (cough syrup)
- shampoo, wave lotion and spray iron pills, vitamins with iron
- lotions and creams
- nail polish and remover
- deodorant
- toilet bowl cleaner
- pine oil and bath oil
- rubbing alcohol
- hairspray

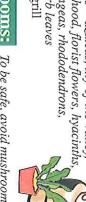
